In the Footsteps of Marco Polo - Denis Belliveau Presents to Middle and Upper School Students

A photographer, an artist and a voracious traveler, Denis Belliveau, along with Francis O'Donnell, retraced Marco Polo's 25,000-mile land and sea journey from Venice to China and back again. Mr. Belliveau visited with Middle and Upper School students this month to recount his experiences and answer questions related to the two-year trek. In preparation for this day, Middle and Upper School history teachers shared an abbreviated version of the Emmy-nominated documentary "In the Footsteps of Marco Polo" with students.

"I have been showing portions of Denis' film in my Advanced Placement world history course for the past three years," said History Department Chair James Harris. "The Middle and Upper School history departments worked to show the film in our courses in advance of Denis' visit and I think that went a long way towards making his time here such a success."

Mr. Belliveau and Mr. O'Donnell spent 10 months researching before leaving on their journey. The

They aimed to develop relationships with people in the United States that could connect them with people in the areas they would be traveling. Additionally, the two men wore the clothes of the locals to help them blend in and simplify what they had to pack in their bags.

"The most important equipment was my camera and film," said Mr. Belliveau during his presentation to the Upper School students. "I slept with my film until I was able to send it home to be developed."

Students asked Mr. Belliveau about financial struggles while on the expedition, the strangest things that happened while traveling, his favorite foods from the journey, language barriers and his greatest takeaways or experiences. Although Marco Polo's voyage was 25,000 miles, after two years Mr. Belliveau and Mr. O'Donnell traveled a total of 33,000 miles from beginning to end, having to deviate from the map to get visas and handle other unexpected obstacles.

"It was the greatest experience of my life," said Mr. Belliveau. "Everything was new. It was all strange, but beautiful."

The answer is a resounding YES! Through this unbelievable journey, Denis and his partner captured unforgettable images that ignite the imagination of every human who shares this planet. Denis and his groundbreaking documentary make history come to life and capture student interest in geopolitics, religion, anthropology, art, and the essence of the human condition. It is opportunities like this that remind students how fascinating life really is. I will never forget the sea of raised hands for the question and answer portion of Denis' presentation – the engagement was unparalleled," said Academic Dean Dr. Jeneen Graham.

Denis' photographic career has taken him to more than 60 countries where he has amassed a wealth of mesmerizing images. His work has been published in numerous magazines, periodicals and books, including *Photographic Magazine*, *Smithsonian Magazine* and the B.B.C. documentary series "Planet Earth," which aired on the Discovery Channel. He is the receiver of the Gallery Award, Eastman Kodak's highest honor for a professional photographer. He lives in New York City with his wife Lisa and sons Jake and Cary James and is currently working on his next documentary.
